### HANDS-ON HISTORY











In The Bridge, Cambridge and Loughborough have been learning about the ancient world. As part of this, they got their hands on some ancient coins and artefacts. The group started their coin study looking at modem coins from the UK and Euros, finding out what they could tell about countries from their coinage. They then used their historical skills to work out what they could learn from objects about societies who left no writing from the oldest objects. They also tried to work out what some Roman and Anglo-Saxon artefacts were, who would have used them and what that tells us about the lives of the peoples who made them. They got their hands on a 10,000 year old arrow head and a coin from the time of Alexander the Great amongst many other bits and pieces.

Well done Year 7 - we hope you enjoyed getting an insight

into these ancient worlds!






## CREATIVE CLASSICS!

Year 7 took part in the first Classics Challenge on Monday, using clues to figure out the meaning of lots of words with an - ology suffix. This is from the ancient Greek via Latin and means someone develops in-depth knowledge through studying the issue. They learnt that Cryptozoology is the study of 'hidden' animals like the yeti and Loch Ness Monster, as well as more recognisable terms like osteology (the study of bones) and microbiology (small life). Tutors identified the winners from each group – either those who finished the challenge first, or were the most enthusiastic. They all received a reward certificate and some chocolate.





Bali will be signing books and meeting students throughout the day.








Writing workshop -20 spaces


