I would like to begin by thanking you for your kind words after receiving the news that from January I will be stepping away from my role as Headteacher to begin a new position within The Futures Trust. The conversations I have had and the emails I have received over the past few days from staff, families and students have meant so much and are a testament to the incredible, supportive community we have here at The Hinckley School. I will continue to lead the school with pride until the end of the year and will work hard to ensure that any hand over gives the consistency and stability that our community and students deserve.

This week, we welcomed Year 7 students and their parents/carers for our Showcase Evening. It was a fantastic event where students used talking points to speak about their time in The Bridge so far, looked through examples of their work with their families and met with their tutor. This year, we also asked guests to create a piece of bunting as a family which we will use to decorate their heart space, further emphasising their sense of belonging. Thank you to everyone who joined us.

Fundraising took place on Wednesday for Mr Webb, a fellow teacher from Hastings who has been diagnosed with glioblastoma, a rare cancerous brain tumour. Our thoughts are with him and his family and it has been moving to see the community rally together in support. Our event was led by our sixth form students and I would like to commend them on their independence, empathy and compassion.

THE GOOD CLOTHES SHOW

On Friday 20th September, our GCSE Art, Craft and Design students travelled to Birmingham to attend The Good Clothes Show. The theme of the show was to educate audiences on the reasons to make sustainable fashion choices and to provide opportunities to get involved in a range of activities that demonstrated sustainability.

Our students had an amazing day packed with a lot of excitement, they actively got involved in a range of practical workshop-based activities where they had the opportunity to make headbands and tote bags from unwanted clothing and remnant fabrics. Students watched sustainable catwalk shows, explored a vast range of exhibits across the show ranging from jewellery made from dried fruit, veg and bio resin and bicycle inner tubes, to clothing made from recycled tights. They also had the opportunity to swap their own unwanted clothes with clothes donated by others visitors and were able to listen to a panel of fashion industry experts, who apply sustainable manufacturing methods into the production of their products.

Our students had an extremely insightful day exploring many methods of making sustainable fashion choices.

As you can see from the photographs below, their work is not only informative, but very creative. Well done Year 7, we hope you have enjoyed exploring the library!






















New Student Led Enrichment Announced

William volunteered for 12 months at Green Towers Youth Club, gaining experience with working with children and young people on a Thursday evening, supporting them with sport activities.

For his physical section of the award, William continued to improve his fitness through kayaking at a local club.

Learning to drive for the skill section of the award has enabled Will to have become a confident and able driver.

The residential section of the award involves a 4 night, 5-day experience, William chose to attend an adventure week, taking part in coasteering, climbing, ringo rides, paddle sports, tunnelling, target sports and high ropes. He gained much from new experiences and learning new skills with Cumulus in Swanage. This experience involved meeting the other members in the group for the first time, often stepping out of his comfort zone and working together with people he do not know.

For the expedition dates, Will was in a team of 6 who took on Snowdonia for their walking adventure, they set themselves a challenging route which tested their physical and mental stamina. They coped with and overcame all the challenges to complete a very successful expedition.
