
## **Gothic Literature Studies**

#### Students cast their votes

Mr Smith's English students have recently completed a homework project to design a new book cover for 'The Picture of Dorian Gray', as part of their Gothic Literature studies. The students then voted for their favourites and the class selected their favourite four.

This piece of work is part of their larger studies of Gothic Fiction throughout the years. Currently, the class is looking at short extracts from various Gothic stories in order to lay the foundations of Gothic tropes and traditions - eventually feeding into their primary novel focus of Coraline later this term. # **Converse Drawings**

#### **Exploring shoe functionality**

After investigating the history of the shoe (starting with the first leather shoe from 5,500 years ago), Year 8 DT students are now beginning to explore a shoe's functionality and how it is adapted for purpose. Most recently we have focussed on the origins of the Converse trainer and how its key features made it a high performance shoe in the sport of basketball. In response, students have been using biro and coffee or hand sanitiser to record the shoe whilst also representing its longevity - their mark making such as hatching has really helped to represent the texture of the canvas of the shoe as well as its softness and flexibility. In more recent years, Converse has been customised by its wearers and the Year 8s spent time dyeing laces to capture a little more character and personality through their designs. The patience taken to lace through their paper drawings was phenomenal and it was so nice to see students helping one another to achieve this effect. Logan even managed to get creative with this (rather fiddly) lace technique!

Well done to Logan, Jasmine, Ava, Archie, Ellie G, Oakleigh, Catalina and all of Miss Webster's Year 8 Designers.

















# **Breast Cancer Awareness**

#### **CoppaFeel! Awareness Lessons**

As part of our commitment to supporting student well-being and health education, we will be running Breast Cancer Awareness lessons with students.

It will be delivered by their teacher using resources provided by CoppaFeel! who are the UK's first breast cancer awareness charity.

Although breast cancer is a serious topic, CoppaFeel! approaches it in an age-appropriate way. They aim to encourage young people to check monthly, educate them to know the signs of breast cancer and empower them to contact their GP if they notice any unusual changes to their chest. When breast cancer is diagnosed early, treatments are more effective and survival rates are higher.

We hope these lessons encourage students to be attuned to their own bodies and helps to break the

stigma around this topic and chest-checking.

#### Wear it Pink Day - 17th October

In addition to our awareness sessions, on **Friday 17th October**, we will be holding a **'Wear it Pink Day'** where students will be able to wear a pink adornment (shoe laces, earrings, headband, gloves, socks etc) alongside their normal uniform for the **suggested donation of £1** - available on Parent Pay. There will also be a bake sale, games and quizzes for students to get involved with during lunchtime; these fundraising activities will be cash only.

It was an emotional sight to see parents. current students, and former students lining the touchline together—cheering, celebrating, and sharing in this special

moment, Rugby is not just back at Hinckley; it is back with energy, ambition, and the belief that once again at lunchtimes, designed to promote we belong alongside the very best schools in the country.

#### Sport for All

A key priority for us is ensuring that all students, regardless of ability, have the chance to take part in sport. Whether competing at a national level, trying something new, or simply enjoying activity with friends, there is a place for everyone at The Hinckley School.

This commitment has already been reflected in our recent achievements. We proudly celebrated the success of our first two cross-country champions, and participation levels are continuing to rise rapidly. #### **Enrichment, Football, and Leadership**

# **V&A STEM COMPETITION**

This year, our Art Department has entered the V&A STEM Innovate Competition, a National Schools Challenge in which students work in teams to design a solution to a real-world problem.

On Monday of this week, Year 8's Evie-Lou and Persephonie joined Miss Webster and Miss Johnson to begin mind mapping their ideas in response to the starting point of 'Rest'. Both students discussed when and how we rest, focussing on children and considering how sensory environments can impact on their rest and relaxation. Throughout the programme, the students will produce a series of design sheets that:

- Investigate their theme and requirements of their target market group
- Record their ideas
- 3. Model their design in a 3D form
- Evaluate the efficacy of their design and respond with solutions

Once the programme concludes, the project will be submitted on 6th March to be judged by an expert panel. If shortlisted, our team will have the opportunity to visit the V&A museum in London (June/July TBC) and pitch their ideas to the panel and audience, with the potential to be named this year's national winners. We wish the students the very best of luck as they continue with their submission and of course will keep you updated with their progress.


# **500 WORDS IS OPEN!**
