## Welcoming Leading Voice in UK Teen Fiction - Bali Rai





On Wednesday, we were joined by leading voice in UK teen fiction, Bali Rai, in one of a long line of exceptional author events organised by our Librarian, Ms Crisp.

During the day, we were privileged enough to offer students in Year 9 and 10 the chance to hear from Bali Rai first hand, as he shared an insight into his background, the importance of breaking stereotypes, empathy and imagination during talks in the Main Hall. In addition, our guest author also worked closely with a smaller group of Year 9 and 10 students on character development, as they created their own 'human pizza' to see what the multi-layers would be to their own character.

During the workshop, Bali Rai spoke about the importance of the character's voice and discussed with the students how building an emotional connection with a character means that people on the page live in the reader's heart for a long time after turning the final page. *(continues on the next page)*

Thank you for joining us Year 5 and we hope to see you again soon!










## 8 FOR 8 GET AN EXCLUSIVE AUTHOR INSIGHT



answer them all. The students also got an exclusive insight into the next book that Alistair is publishing in the near future.









## Geography Spotlight with Miss Quinn

#### **Y7 Volcanoes**

This week, Miss Quinn's Year 7 groups have brought in their 3D models of composite volcanoes. The students could complete the models in groups or individually. We had excellent models made of cake, paper mâché, and even some woodwork. Students designed well-detailed models of the volcanoes including the crater, the main vent, the magma chamber, earths layers and even volcanic bombs. In lesson, students took it in turns to explain how they made their volcano and we took the models outside to explode the volcanoes with coca-cola and mentos! Well done Year 7- you have shown excellent PRIDE in your constructions of the volcanoes.





#### Y7 and Y8 Antarctica Flags competition


In October, Year 7 and Year 8 students participated in the Antarctica flags competition run by the Geography department. Students learnt about Antarctica Day- the 1st December- and were then tasked with designing flags to send to Antarctica to celebrate Antarctica Day which marks the signing of the Antarctic Treaty on December 1st 1959. There were two flags submitted comprising of eight Year 7 and Year 8 students work in total. We have finally received news that our flags have made it to Antarctica. The winners' flags have been photographed at Signy Research Station in front of a Chinstrap Penguin colony (Latitude 60°43′ S, Longitude 45°46′ W). The Signy Research Station is a place where scientists study the effects of climate change on the southern ocean ecosystems, particularly focusing on penguin, seabird, and seal biology.

The Hinckley school has been awarded a certificate for "designing inspirational flags in the interests of all mankind!" . The winners of the competition will receive their certificates in the celebration assemblies this week. Congratulations again to the winners of the competition.

#### Y8 Overfishing posters

Over the last couple of weeks, Year 8 have been learning about sustainable management of the oceans as part of their Central and South America topic. Students have been learning about coral bleaching and overfishing as issues in the Caribbean. Year 8 have shown excellent PRIDE completing their posters to raise awareness about what the challenges are, the causes of overfishing, the impacts, and solutions. They have carefully considered the design of their posters and added excellent illustrations to attract the readers. Well done Year 8.

## Young Writer of the Year Inspires A Level Students

Year 12 English Language students met with author Harriet Baker, winner of the Telegraph 2025 Young Writer of the Year Award this week.

Harriet spoke to the class via video link, about her path through education, her experience of university and choosing to do a PhD. She talked about her book 'Rural Hours' and what inspired her to write about a time in the lives of Virginia Woolf, Sylvia Townsend Warner and Rosamond Lehmann. She discussed the genre, 'creative non-fiction' and the writing techniques she loves to write in.

Harriet answered questions from the group, then set a challenge for the students to do a short piece of 'creative non-fiction' of their own which she will read and critique.
