
I hope over the last few weeks of the newsletter, you have had a real feel for the positive start our other year groups have had and their experience in the school, including our sixth from. We are proud

366 days before


Everyone is crying buy me.

I'm being watched.




"Have some coleslaw, Dan." Mum shoves a small plastic box my way. It's encrusted with congealed mayonnaise.
