I just wanted to say a final public thank you to everyone for everything you did supporting me along the way. Hopefully you all know by now that the marathon went really well and other than some quite sore legs Mon-Weds, I've been up and about and relatively normal (?!) since. I've been trying to get around to all the student assemblies this week to thank them as well – I cannot tell you how amazing so many of them have been over the last few months with words of encouragement / asking me when I'm doing it and how it went. They really have made a big difference over what has been an incredibly difficult time for me. way.

I'm not sure what I can really say about my London Marathon 2023 journey other than the classic "It's been emotional." With your help, we have raised a staggering £6,650 at the latest count, which is going to help make such a huge difference to young people suffering with their mental health. We will never get over losing our son, but the pride we feel in this legacy in his honour is huge. We do thank you ALL from the bottom of our hearts. I know Place2Be are equally grateful for all the support from the school and have told me that so far, the marathon team of 25 runners have raised over £67,000.

It was on London Marathon day in October that we lost our son and Sue was actually down there supporting with friends when she received the phone call. Whilst the event has now moved back to its usual date in April, I'm sure it will forever be quite the emotional trigger for us both in years to come. Of course, if you ever watch, spectate, or take part in the marathon itself, you see literally thousands of other people running in memory of lost love ones – it really is an event that brings so many people together and helps make something positive out of tragedy.

The Hinckley School is equally proud of Mr Lee and the students that have shown incredible empathy and compassion in their endeavours to support and fund raise.

We look forward to supporting his next challenge—the London-Essex 100 mile bike ride!






### CARNEGIE GROUP PLAYLIST


This week Carnegie group discussed 'Medusa' by Jessie Blurton.

### Lessons from history— Mr Beavin returns

The Sixth Form History students enjoyed a talk by Mr Beavin from Hinckley Museum. He came to discuss the development on the hosiery industry and the effects of the industrial revolution on the people of Hinckley. They were treated to a wide history of Hinckley, including the opportunity to look at some artefacts. A particular highlight for the students, was learning about the origin of the name Barwell. It comes from "Boar Well" or place wild boar go to drink.

All students felt they were now able to add a local dimension to their course essays.



Some parents may remember Mr Beavin as a History Teacher at the former John Cleveland college He was a founded of the Hinckley Local History group and became the first editor of the Hinckley Historian.

One of the founding directors of Hinckley and District Museum, he was chairman of the museum for 15 years. He also served on Hinckley Civic Society.
